Senior professor profiles

Maria Gabriella Baldarelli is associate professor General and Applied Accounting at the University of Bologna, Rimini Campus. Her main research topics range from management control to social and environmental accounting to governance of ethically oriented businesses. She is author of numerous articles, chapters of books and volumes, among which: *Ethically oriented businesses. Mission, governance and accountability* (CLU EB, Bologna, 2005); *The harmonizing of accounting principles in Europe: which “rules” for small and medium-sized businesses?* (with G. Capodoglio, Rirea, Rome, 2006).

Luigino Bruni is associate professor of Political Economy at the University of Milan-Bicocca. He deals with social economy and the history of the economical thought of the Economy of Communion. He is author of numerous papers published in international journals. Among his most recent books are: *Civil Economy* (with Stefano Zamagni, il Mulino, Bologna, 2004); *The Economy, Happiness and the Others* (Cittá Nuova, Rome, 2004); *Reciprocity. Dynamics of Cooperation, Economy and Civil Society* (Bruno Mondadori, Milan, 2006); *The Wound of the Other* (Il Margine, Trent, 2007).

Luca Crivelli, doctor of research in Public Economy at the University of Zurich (Switzerland), is professor of Political Economy at the University of the Italian Switzerland and Executive Director of the Masters Program in economy and health and social health management. Among his research interests are federalism in health, vertical and territorial equity and the role of interpersonal relations in economic transactions. His many publications include titles in Italian, German and English, among which are: *Towards and Economy of Communion: A Multidisciplinary Approach* (co-edited by L. Bruni, Cittá Nuova, Rome, 2004); *Efficiency in the Swiss Nursing Home Sector* (with M. Filippini and D. Lunati, SECO, Bern, 2001).

Benedetto Gui is permanent professor of political economy in the University of Padova's Department of Economy. He deals with work politics, economical problems of non-profit cooperative businesses, and the economic implications of interpersonal relationships. Among his publications appear various papers in national and international scientific journals, the editing of some volumes, among which: *The Third Sector, between economizing and values* (Gregoriana Editrice, Padova, 1997) and *Economics and Social Interaction: Accounting for Interpersonal Relations* (with R. Sugden, Cambridge University Press, 2005). Most recently, he published *An Introduction to the Economic System* (Cleun, Padova, 2007).

Vittorio Pelligra is researcher of political economy and teaches advanced micro-economy and the economy of decisions in the University of Cagliari, Italy. At the University of Milan-Bicocca, he teaches courses in game theory and organizations in the Masters of Civil Economy and Non-Profit. He received his PhD in Economics at Norwich. He deals with game theory, experimental economy, social neurosciences and the economy of the welfare state. His research, theoretical and empirical, focuses on the role of unselfish behavior in interpersonal and institutional dynamics. He is author of numerous papers and books, among which: *The Paradox of Trust* (Il Mulino, Bologna, 2007).
